WHEREUPON, the following proceedings were had:

CHAIR SIMPSON: The next is BER 2019-05

OC -- I believe that should be SM. How it got to

be opencut I don't know -- Western Energy Area F.

Of course the Board assumed jurisdiction for this matter at our June meeting. And we may retain the case or assign it to a Hearing Examiner. The contested case has been -- was conducted, and the parties have filed proposed FOFCOLs and exceptions and responses. Findings of fact and conclusions of law need to be prepared.

The recommendation in this case is that all of the filings leading up to preparation of the findings of fact and conclusions of law have been filed. And I believe the most efficient way to wrap up this case, get the final proposed FOFCOL prepared, would be to assign it to a Hearing Examiner. Is there a motion for discussion?

MS. MOISEY-SCHERER: Chair Simpson, this is Sandy. Sam King of DEQ has his hand up.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Mr. King.

MR. KING: Yes. Thank you, Board Member

Simpson, and Board members. Sam King for DEQ. If I may just make a recommendation. I know Mr. Yemington and Mr. Hernandez are also on the meeting, so they may want to weigh in here as well.

But my initial thought is this case is pretty technical, and the proposed decision is going to be I imagine quite lengthy. Some of the issues were disposed of on summary judgment, and the contested case hearing resolved or should resolve the final issue regarding the status of whether there's a stream, and whether it is intermittent or ephemeral.

I don't want to necessarily take up Ms. Hupp's time. I know she has her own practice. But my thought was rather than assign this case to a Hearing Examiner from DLI, it might be most efficient to assign it to Ms. Hupp. Her workload obviously takes precedence over that, but I think it may be the most efficient way to get this case resolved and moving forward. So just a thought, just a recommendation. Open to hearing the other parties' thoughts as well. Thanks.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you, Sam.

Comments from Westmoreland? I'm sorry. Shiloh

1 Hernandez, you have your hand up.

MR. HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Chairman Simpson, members of the Board. Can you hear me all right?

CHAIR SIMPSON: Yes, I can.

MR. HERNANDEZ: I agree with what Mr. King said. This case is pretty technical. At this stage there's only one issue that's remaining. I think the matter has been submitted for decision since May 2024, so we are eager to get a decision, at least a proposed decision in this.

Given the material involved, I agree with Mr. King that a Hearing Examiner is the best way to go. As far as far as who that Hearing Examiner is, I have no position. I certainly respect Ms. Hupp's legal acumen and ability to do this. I think that it probably should go to whomever has the time to really dig into it.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you. Mr. Yemington.

MR. YEMINGTON: Chair Simpson, members of the Board. Good morning. I certainly appreciate the opportunity to present. Sam Yemington on behalf of Westmoreland.

We share Counsel's presentation of the case, and the status of the contested case. With respect to how best this could move forward, we respectfully join DEQ, and request that Ms. Hupp be assigned as the Hearing Examiner. We think that she has the appropriate qualifications, and is consistent with the expertise component that MAPA requires. So we think that is both the path that would be of least resistance, and she's best qualified to handle this. So again, we join the folks at DEQ and MEIC in that request.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you, Mr.

Yemington. I guess I probably ought to put the question to Dana Hupp. What are your thoughts?

MS. HUPP: Chairman Simpson and Board members. I am certainly happy to make the time to

take this project on this fall and winter if that's the decision of the Board.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you, Dana.

Discussion among the Board. First of all, is there a motion that we can use as a basis for discussion, whether to assign this to an outside Hearing Examiner, or to retain jurisdiction and have Board Counsel prepare the FOFCOL.

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: I would make a

motion to assign it to a Hearings Officer, but my motion would be that it wouldn't be Dana because the Board is going to have to rely on her maybe to give us independent legal advice with respect to any decision that the Hearing Examiner comes up, out of it, and I think if she's the Hearings Officer, I just think that's a bad practice to have the Board's Counsel be also a Hearing Officer.

So my motion be just to -- I'd move that the Board appoint a Hearings Examiner to hear this case that has the requisite expertise to bring a speedy resolution to the matter.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Is there a second to the motion? Is there a second?

BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: I second the motion so we can have discussion, I think more discussion. So I'll go ahead and second that motion.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you, Julia.

BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: And then I do have a question, if I may, Mr. Chair. So if it's not Ms. Hupp, and we don't have AG's help any more, who are our Hearing Examiners? I am even confused as to who we have left.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Well, our alternative is
to assign it to the Department of Labor and
Industry, and they would pick the Hearing Examiner
that would pick up this case. That --

BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: Out of their Department?

alternatives.

CHAIR SIMPSON: I'm sorry?

BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: Out of Labor?

Would the Hearing Examiner come from Labor?

CHAIR SIMPSON: Yes.

BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: Oh, interesting.

CHAIR SIMPSON: And there is, as we discussed at the last meeting, there is a Memorandum of Understanding between DEQ and DLI to utilize their Hearings Examiners. And they according -- (inaudible) -- when we were first going through this process of evaluating

There are Hearings Examiners in that group that have some natural resource background, and that's really at this point all I know. We have not up to this point assigned any cases to Hearings Examiners at DLI. This would be our first.

I quess another matter just for

consideration is that I had requested authorization from the Governor's Office to retain outside Hearings Examiners which initially would have been Dana, and they declined to do that because of cost. Of course outside Counsel is considerably more costly than in-state Counsel, government Counsel. But it really is the decision of the Board which way to go on this.

BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: Mr. Chair, I see Stacy also has her hand up, but may I make one more comment?

CHAIR SIMPSON: Certainly.

know, this is a complicated case, and I'm not sure that I'm comfortable sending this over to a Hearing Examiner at DLI as our first test case to see how it goes. So I think I would be more comfortable. I do understand where Board Member Payne is coming from. I certainly understand that. But I just would be really hesitant to take this on as the first one that we ask DLI to be a Hearing Examiner for. So I guess I'm going to have to vote against the motion, but anyway that's what I'm thinking at this point. Thank you.

CHAIR SIMPSON: The other thing I think

we need to keep in mind here is that this case is not at its beginning, it's near its end. And I like you, like everybody else on the Board, I spent quite a bit of time reading -- well, this wasn't the one that we circulated. I'm sorry.

I have read through it. Yes, it is a highly technical question. Having a background in coal mining myself -- not at Colstrip -- I have a number of questions that I think will be need to be answered in order to have a valid FOFCOL. If we assign it outside of the Board, then we lose any opportunity to bring our backgrounds into this case until it comes back before us.

Now, this was something I had intended to mention earlier, and I'll kind of go off on a tangent right now, because the question really is pertinent here, and that is that the Board of Environmental Review is not a court of law. It is a citizen board that's been appointed by the Governor to exercise -- essentially to handle the administrative appeals of Department decisions.

And as a citizen Board, I think the intent and our obligation as Board members is to bring our background, diversity of background knowledge -- as you recall, the law requires a

variety of backgrounds on this Board to bring to bear on the various problems, questions that come before us.

And so I think part of our, a significant part of our responsibility here is to bring our background knowledge to bear where appropriate on the cases that come before us. At the same time, we have to keep in mind that in addition to -- as part of the administrative review process, we need to be mindful that we're building a record should the case be appealed to the District Court.

And so even though our own authorities may be limited to what is contained in the statute that is at hand, there are quite often tangential issues that come forward that really the Board doesn't have authority to deal with.

The most significant, the best example of that is what we see on the gravel pit case we talked about earlier, Gallatin Gateway, where the question there is a constitutional question that was taken to the Court, and the Court ruled that in order -- even though it is a constitutional question, in order for it to be considered, the petitioners have to take it through the

administrative process first, and establish a valid claim.

So I guess just to summarize, we certainly need to be mindful of the legal side of things, but we need to have a handle on the technical questions that are at issue in these cases as well. So I guess -- Was there another hand up before I started bloviating?

(No response)

CHAIR SIMPSON: Further discussion.

(No response)

CHAIR SIMPSON: A motion has been made and seconded to assign this case to an outside Hearing Examiner.

VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: I had my hand up,
Chairman Simpson. This is Stacy. I was
essentially going to say the same thing that Julia
said. I think our previous discussion really
shows the value of this Board, and how we're
moving forward. How we're shifting how we're
moving forward I think is more beneficial to the
process, and the addition of Dana Hupp to the
equation as far as the legal representation for
the Board. And our movement forward with
retaining some of these cases I think really shows

the value of referring this case to Ms. Hupp.

And because this is a technical issue, and it appears that there's really one remaining technical issue that really needs to be focused on to move this forward, I also feel like that supports our shift in how we're handling stuff, and also the movement forward of the value of that shift. So for that reason I would need to vote against the motion as well.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you, Stacy. Further discussion. Joe.

BOARD MEMBER SMITH: Yes, sir. I'm in agreement with I think everyone on this. I certainly hear Board Member Payne's concerns, but given where we're at right now, I think that I would be more in favor of giving this case to Ms. Hupp.

What I would ask, though, is there any way that we could get a list of potential Hearings Examiners from DLI with their background and qualifications for the future? Because I do think Board Member Payne brings up a valid point, and it would be nice to see who we could apply future cases to for Hearings Examiners.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Valid question. Mr.

Fehr is on the call, isn't he? Deputy Director 1 2 Fehr. DEPUTY DIRECTOR FEHR: Yes, I am. 3 CHAIR SIMPSON: Could you comment on 4 5 that, please. DEPUTY DIRECTOR FEHR: I think we could 6 7 certainly make a request. I could step into that and ask them for sure. 8 CHAIR SIMPSON: I thought it should be 9 fairly straight forward, but I wanted to pass that 10 11 on to the Department. 12 DEPUTY DIRECTOR FEHR: Yes, I will make 13 an ask. CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you very much. 14 15 We'll move forward with that. Further discussion? 16 BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: I've got a 17 question. CHAIR SIMPSON: We've heard from all of 18 19 the -- Allan, did you --20 BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: Yes. 21 CHAIR SIMPSON: Do you have further 22 comment? 23 BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: Chairman, you made 24 a comment that you had requested outside Counsel,

we would be able to use an outside Hearings

Examiner, and you told us that wasn't approved because of fiscal issues.

So I guess then as we go forward with

Dana then, is that in contradiction to what -
Because she's not a member of the Department of

Labor and Industry, and I imagine her rate is

going to be higher than theirs for this. So could

you educate us exactly kind of what the limitation

was there?

CHAIR SIMPSON: Well, here's a comparison. The cost at DLI is \$60 an hour. The cost of -- Dana's hourly rate, she's charging us \$250 an hour. That is substantially less than the standard billing rate, so as a public service she has offered the reduced rate for her service to the Board. And the exact question you raised is the one I'm turning over in my mind right now.

And I guess I would -- I'm inclined myself to vote against the motion also, and the reason is that this is a case that is very near its conclusion. And I think as we move forward and new cases are brought before us, it will be a much easier decision to make as to where, and what cases, and at what point to assign to DLI.

The only other alternative I can see is

to defer action on this until we can investigate the background of the Hearings Examiners that would be available at DLI. And these cases have dragged on for so long right now, I'm very eager to keep them moving forward and get them resolved as quickly as we can. For whatever reason, this

7 is one of several cases that's really lagged, and 8 I would like to get it resolved as soon as

9 practically possible.

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: Chairman, I'm with you. If it's dragged on for this long, let's get it resolved. If we can get the list of available Hearings Examiners from the Department of Labor and Industry for future reference, I'd rather make a decision today one way or the other. So I wouldn't want to defer it.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Further discussion?
(No response)

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you, Allan. A motion has been made and seconded. Let me, before I proceed, Board Member Payne, do you wish to keep your motion in play --

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: I do, but if somebody wants to offer an amendment to change it to what I think everybody is going to vote for,

CHAIR SIMPSON: The vote was four against, one for. Motion fails. Is there an alternate motion?

BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: Mr. Chair, this is Julia. I would move that we assign BER 2019-05 Western Energy to Ms. Hupp as our Hearing Examiner.

VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: I'll second the motion.

CHAIR SIMPSON: A motion has been made and seconded to assign this case to Ms. Hupp. I guess there is a technical question here, and that is if the Board retains jurisdiction in this case, we're not really assigning it to a Hearing Examiner, we're assigning it to Board Counsel, and I think at least I think that's an important distinction; that is, we've decided to handle it internally.

Now, in the past, our past practice when Terisa was representing the Board, she acted as both Hearing Examiner on a number of cases and

19 Counsel to the Board, so that's essentially the 1 2 situation that we would have here. So as a practical matter that's what would happen if the 3 Board retains jurisdiction. 4 5 BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: Would you like me to amend my statement, saying Hearings Examiner --6 7 CHAIR SIMPSON: You read my mind. BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: -- I would like 8 9 to have Ms. Hupp as our Board Counsel retain that 10 case. CHAIR SIMPSON: A motion has been made 11 for the Board to retain the case; is that what 12 13 you're saying, Julia? BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: Yes, and have Ms. 14 15 Hupp be the -- I guess not Hearings Examiner, but 16 be our Board Counsel on that case. 17 VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: I'll second the 18 motion. CHAIR SIMPSON: A motion has been made 19 20 and seconded for the Board to retain jurisdiction 21 in this case, and for the FOFCOL to be prepared by 22 Board Counsel. Is that a fair statement of the 23 motion?

BOARD MEMBER ALTEMUS: Yes, thank you.

CHAIR SIMPSON: We have two hands up

here. Mr. Hernandez.

MR. HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Chairman
Simpson, members of the Board. I think Sam is
going to raise the same issue that I am, which is
just as litigants in this case, I think it would
be helpful to have clarity on this as far as what
the next steps would be. If the matter is
assigned to a Hearing Examiner, then the Hearing
Examiner would prepare proposed findings and
conclusions, that would be followed by exceptions
from the parties, whichever party was unsatisfied,
which would then go to the Board.

I think that method would be clear because it's what's most clearly laid out in my understanding of MAPA Section 2-4-621. I think that if the Board retains jurisdiction and has Ms. Hupp prepare a decision on behalf of the Board, it muddies the water, because I think even in that case there would have to be an opportunity for objections and exceptions since the Board would not have heard the entire contested case.

There was a trial on this a few years back. I have to quit make it confusing. I would just like to offer for the Board's consideration that under MAPA Section 2-4-621(4), the matter can

be assigned to Ms. Hupp as a Hearing Examiner.

She can then prepare proposed findings and conclusions, offer those to the Board, and then she may retain her duties as the Board's attorney without -- so long as the FOFCOL are done. So she still would be able to have that dual role as the Hearing Examiner but still provide advice to the Board.

I think that's the clearest method under the rules. And I'd love to hear Mr. King and Mr. Yemington's position on it, but I think that that would be the easiest path forward on this case, because I share the interest of the Board in resolving this in the clearest most face forward manner possible. Thank you.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you very much.

Mr. King.

MR. KING: Yes. Thank you, Board Chair. I just echo Mr. Hernandez's position here. I think it would make it confusing if technically the Board was retaining jurisdiction. I also think it would be odd because really the case has been tried now at this point, in which the Board was not privy to all of the facts and information that has been developed up to this point.

So I think that I'm in agreement with Mr. Hernandez that the cleanest route is to assign Ms. Hupp as the Hearing Examiner, if that's the route that the Board wants to go, and then the parties will have an opportunity to brief exceptions, similar to, for example, when Terisa was Board Counsel as well. So that's my two cents. Thank you.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you, Sam. Mr. Yemington.

MR. YEMINGTON: Chair Simpson, members of the Board. We share DEQ and MEIC's presentation. And with respect to MAPA and the subsection referenced by Mr. Hernandez, we share that interpretation. This process is contemplated by MAPA, would allow Ms. Hupp to develop the proposed FOFCOLs, present those to the Board, and then participate in her role as BER Counsel.

So I think that may respond to Member Payne's question with respect to her two roles in reaching the finish line here. So again, we do agree with the folks at MEIC and DEQ that this is the best way to get to the finish line here, and the one that is most clearly consistent with the parties' expectations under MAPA.

Thank you. Just to be

sure I'm clear, is there a concern here about the process of going through exceptions and responses?

And I would anticipate that would be part of the process in any case.

CHAIR SIMPSON:

MR. HERNANDEZ: If I may, Chair Simpson.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Mr. Hernandez. Well, I
see several hands up. Mr. Hernandez.

MR. HERNANDEZ: Just to respond to your last question, Chairman Simpson, I think that I agree with Mr. Yemington that it is just more clearly in line with the provision of MAPA Section Montana Code Annotated 2-4-621 to formally assign it to the Hearing Examiner, have her prepare a proposed FOFCOL, and allow exceptions.

If the Board were to retain jurisdiction, and prepare a proposed order, technically it might still have to go through the exceptions process, but it would be a weird effort to try to fit a square peg in a round hole. I think that it would just be cleanest to officially assign jurisdiction of the matter to Ms. Hupp if she would take it as the Hearing Examiner.

So I don't think that if that weren't the case that exceptions wouldn't be allowed. I

think it would be confusing, and not clearly in line with MAPA, which is just a problem we could avoid at this stage, if that makes sense. And I'm happy to answer questions if anyone on the Board wants to discuss. And I suspect that Counsel also

CHAIR SIMPSON: Thank you. I think what we're talking about here is more a matter of semantics than anything else. I think the process will be the same. Board Member Payne.

can help clarify if I said anything incorrect.

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: First off, just to respond to Counsel's statements that -- I just want to be clear. I didn't say that it would be improper. I said it was my concern it's just not the best practice. And I still don't think it's the best practice. I think it subjects the -- on appeal the Board can be subjected to collateral attack that it wasn't exercising its independent jurisdiction when its own Counsel is -- we're inclined to follow our own attorney more so than maybe another Hearing Examiner.

So at this point none of the parties are objecting on that issue, so maybe in this particular case it's not as big of an issue.

But I guess I have a question, which was

raised by Counsel about is rhetorical, is the
Board retaining jurisdiction. Is it better to say
retaining jurisdiction, or submitting it to a
Hearing Examiner?

As I understand from the discussion,
this matter has been -- there's been some
determinations prior in this matter. So has this
matter previously been referred out to a Hearing
Examiner?

CHAIR SIMPSON: Yes, this case was assigned to Rob Cameron as an outside Hearing Examiner and outside Counsel, and the case came back to us when Mr. Cameron notified the Board that because of health problems he would not be able to continue.

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: It may well then be a matter of semantics, but sometimes semantics matter.

CHAIR SIMPSON: That's my concern here.

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: And maybe I'd offer an amendment to the motion that we appoint Dana as the successor Hearings Examiner, because even though the Hearings Examiner has still -- we've referred it to a Hearings Examiner, but still that referral kind of technically I think is still out

there, we just have to -- unless the Board has officially then said, "We want to retain that jurisdiction."

So I think the proper motion is that we nominate Dana as the subsequent or replacement Hearing Examiner to replace Rob, and I would offer that amendment to the motion.

CHAIR SIMPSON: There's been an amendment offered to the motion to assign our Board Counsel Dana Hupp as successor Hearing Examiner. Is there a second to that motion?

VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: I'll second the motion.

CHAIR SIMPSON: A motion has been made and seconded to amend the motion, so we're voting now on amending the motion. We had another hand up or two. Before we proceed to a vote, are there any further comments from Counsel for the parties?

(No response)

CHAIR SIMPSON: We're voting on the amendment to the motion. It's been moved and seconded. All in favor, say aye.

(Response)

CHAIR SIMPSON: Motion carries, I believe. Opposed.

1 (No response)

CHAIR SIMPSON: Motion carries. Is there any further discussion on the amended motion?

(No response)

CHAIR SIMPSON: The amended motion is for the Board, if I understand correctly, is for the Board to retain jurisdiction on this case, but to assign the case to Board Counsel as successor Hearing Examiner; is that an accurate statement, or am I misunderstanding something?

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: I think you might be misunderstanding something. It's that the Board as I understand -- My amended motion was that we just -- didn't talk about retaining jurisdiction, it was just that -- it had already been referred out to a Hearing Examiner, so this is just now that Hearing Examiner has resigned.

So this motion on the floor is then that we just appoint Dana as the successor, keeping the referral out, not necessarily keeping the jurisdiction with the Board, so that when she comes back, she will have the findings of fact and conclusions of law, that then there will be exceptions, and we would examine it like any other

Hearing Examiner matter.

VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: When I made my second, that is exactly how I understood the amended motion to be and why I seconded it, as Board Member Payne just outlined.

CHAIR SIMPSON: I'll tell you what my concern is straight out, and that is as I mentioned earlier, I had made the specific request to the Governor's Office and was turned down, and so I'm not sure I can support the motion. Further discussion? Dana Hupp, you've got your hand up. Please. I'm sorry. Please proceed.

MS. HUPP: Chairman Simpson, and Board members, just a technicality. The Board did already assume jurisdiction of this matter in June, so to refer it to a Hearing Examiner, there will need to be a formal referral to me as a Hearing Examiner if that's how you decide to proceed. So the Board currently has jurisdiction.

And Chair Simpson, and I perhaps can let the parties address this, I think their concern is that because there is already a factual record that needs to be reviewed, if I'm reviewing it the full Board isn't, and so I think that's why they thought it would be more appropriate to have me

appointed to be the Hearing Examiner versus just acting as Board Counsel. But I'd invite them to comment on that, but I think that's substantively

what the concern is.

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: That's exactly my concern, because if it's not officially referred out, then each member will have to go through the entire record to review the case, and then to vote, you know, before we can vote on it. And I'm not -- that's probably -- I don't know.

I guess I'd ask Board Counsel this
question, but that may even include the material
that preceded all this, the prior matters, but I'm
not sure. But anyway, certainly the matters that,
you know, any of the material generated going
forward I think the Board members would be
required to review all of that before we could
vote to approve any of Dana's findings of fact and
conclusions of law.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Further discussion.

(No response)

CHAIR SIMPSON: Would you for the record please state your motion again, amended motion.

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: Well, the motion is that the Board appoint Dana as the successor

found the answer.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Mr. Hernandez.

MR. HERNANDEZ: Chairman Simpson, I believe that the relevant provision is posted in the chat. If anyone disagrees with me on that. I think that's the controlling provisions of this question.

CHAIR SIMPSON: So it's a majority of

the membership?

MS. MOISEY-SCHERER: Chair Simpson, this is Sandy. In the webinar chat, Mr. Hernandez has put the Montana Code Annotated citation. That's in the webinar chat.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Say that again, please.

MS. MOISEY-SCHERER: In the webinar chat, Mr. Hernandez has quoted Montana Code
Annotated 2-15-124. "A majority of the membership constitutes a quorum to do business. A favorable vote of at least a majority of the members in attendance at a meeting at which a quorum is present is required to adopt any resolution, motion, or other decision unless otherwise provided by law."

CHAIR SIMPSON: "Unless otherwise provided by law."

MS. MOISEY-SCHERER: Mr. Yemington has his hand up as well.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Mr. Yemington. Yes, Mr. Yemington, please.

MR. YEMINGTON: Chairman Simpson,
members of the Board. I share Mr. Hernandez's
presentation of the law, and I would just further
note that that provision by my reading became

effective on May 1st of this year.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Okay. Just for the record, could we read that provision again, please.

MS. MOISEY-SCHERER: "A majority of the membership constitutes a quorum to do business. A favorable vote of at least a majority of the members in attendance at a meeting at which a quorum is present is required to adopt any resolution, motion, or other decision unless otherwise provided by law." Montana Code Annotated 2-15-124.

CHAIR SIMPSON: I guess the only place I can think of where there might be anything further helpful in the law is the section having to do with the formation and appointment of the Board which I do not have in front of me. So I'm going to suggest for now that we make a -- in fact I'll make a motion that we table this matter and revisit it at the end of the meeting, until somebody has a chance to look that up.

VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: Can you clarify what you're trying to find, Chairman Simpson? It seems like that statute is pretty clear.

CHAIR SIMPSON: What I'm trying to

clarify is we just had a vote of three to two.

Now we have a quorum because we have four members present, a majority of the Board. And my understanding up until this point is that we need a majority vote of the Board, that is, four votes in order to pass a motion.

We had a vote of three to two in favor of the motion, which in that case would fail, but it would pass if -- according to this latest language that was read to us where a majority of the members of the Board present. There's five of us present, so three is a majority, and in that case the motion would pass. So it makes a difference whether the motion passes or fails.

VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: Correct. However, it seems like the guidance is clear, but you don't feel like it's clear?

CHAIR SIMPSON: Well, it says also
"unless otherwise provided by law," and that's why
I think we ought to take a look at the enabling
legislation for the Board, just to be sure that
there isn't something there that specifies a
majority of the Board.

VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: In the actual Montana Code Annotated for the Board of

Environmental Review there's no discussion of that

vote. So if you're looking to that Montana Code

Annotated regulation for the Board, there isn't a

discussion of the vote, like the --

CHAIR SIMPSON: Are you looking at the formation of the Board or the appointment of Board members?

VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: I'm looking at -BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: I have a possible
resolution so we can move on. I'm willing to
change my vote, just because I think the reading
of the law is clear. So if we want to -- however
procedurally how to do that, I'm not exactly sure.
I think if we want to move for reconsideration of
the issue, I would vote for it, and then we could
move on with the four votes.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Is that a motion to reconsider?

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: But as voting against it, I don't know if I can make that motion. I think someone who voted for it has to make that motion.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Mr. Hernandez, you have your hand up.

MR. HERNANDEZ: Chairman Simpson,

members of the Board. I just wanted to offer to respond to your question, Chairman Simpson, about that enabling legislation creating the Board. I can post that in the chat right now. It refers the Board to the provision that I previously put in the chat.

But just to move this conversation forward and some clarity, if you wish, I can post that provision in the webinar chat also.

CHAIR SIMPSON: Is there any guidance there about a vote of the Board?

MR. HERNANDEZ: It directs the Board to the provision that I already pointed to in here.

I'll put it in right now. But it says, Subsection (4) says, "The Board is designated a quasi-judicial Board for the purposes of 2-14-124," and 2-15-124 is a provision that says that "a majority of the members present is required to adopt a motion."

As Mr. Yemington noted, that's a provision that's been in effect since May of this year.

VICE CHAIR AGUIRRE: And that was the provision, the exact provision that Mr. Hernandez is speaking to that I was referencing as the --

unless --

CHAIR SIMPSON: That being the case, I had stated that the motion had failed because it did not reach the four vote threshold. That was apparently in error, and so the motion passes on a vote of three to two.

BOARD MEMBER PAYNE: I guess that's good to know going forward just generally as well.

CHAIR SIMPSON: It certainly is. I'm trying to think back as to whether we've had any other votes that got into this situation after May 1st. I don't think so, but I don't know. I hadn't expected to get hung up on this item for so long, but it's been a productive discussion just the same. Thank you everybody for your contributions to it, and let's move on.
