

## **COMPOSTING IN MONTANA**

The following is an overview of the importance of composting and the practical steps Montanans can take to start composting in their household. Composting is an integral part of creating a greener and less wasteful Montana. Food waste is incredibly prevalent, and it is using precious landfill space. Composting is a practical and accessible solution for Montanans to take a personal stand against unnecessary waste. Start composting today!

## Why Compost?

According to a Gallup study, the average amount of food waste per American household is 3 pounds per week. Additionally, according to the EPA roughly 40 million tons of food waste is sent to the landfills each year. Composting is an efficient and fruitful way to dispose of those old vegetables and food scraps in an environmentally protective manner. Starting to compost may seem like a daunting task, but it does not have to be! Keep reading to understand some composting basics and understand how to make composting work for wherever you currently reside.





# **How Does Composting Work?**

Composting, put simply, is product that results from the decomposition of organic matter. The process of composting is aerobic, meaning that it uses oxygen to break down its components. Four main elements are necessary for composting to be effective: carbon, nitrogen, oxygen, and water. The carbon comes from "browns" which refers to carbon rich inputs such as paper or cardboard. Nitrogen comes from "greens" which refers to nitrogen rich inputs such as food waste. The generally recommended ratio of browns to greens is 70% browns (carbon rich inputs) to 30% greens (nitrogen rich inputs). With your compost think about layering the browns and greens to get a good distribution for more effective decomposition. Oxygen can be added to the pile through "turning" the pile, bringing the outer, drier material inward and the inner, warmer material outward. Finally, an effective compost pile should have a moisture content of 40-60%.

# What Should You Compost?

- Fruits and vegetables
- Eggshells
- · Paper towels, napkins, shredded brown bags and non-glossy cardboard
- Natural fabric
- Coffee grounds, coffee filters, tea leaves/bags (no staples)
- Plant stalks, twigs, and dry leaves
- Citrus fruits

## What Should You Not Compost?

- Animal products like meat, fish, cheese and bones
- Fats, oils, and grease
- Pet waste and cat litter
- Dryer lint
- Produce stickers

These are general guidelines for doing your own composting indoors. If you are paying for a composting bucket from a commercial composter, check their guidelines for what you can put in your compost bucket. If you are unsure about putting something in your compost, do some research first!

# **Composting In an Apartment?**

If you think that composting is not an option for you because you live in an apartment, you are wrong! Let's break down (ha!) how you can start composting in your apartment.

The easiest way to start composting in your apartment would be through a commercial service (see composting companies in Montana listed below). However, if you are unable to pay for that service or are not within the service area for a company, or you simply want to try home composting yourself then see the different options below.

A popular method of indoor composting is called "vermicomposting" which utilizes worms to decompose the waste and create a nutrient rich compost. You can either buy a kit to get started or create your own vermicompost.

You are also able to create or buy your own compost bin (minus the worms) although ensuring adequate decomposition may be a little trickier.

The finished compost can be mixed into the soil for your plants or the soil of the herb garden in your window. You can even give it to a friend to use in their garden.

Again, if it is right for you, check out options for home composting containers through a local composting service in Montana. They have multiple sizes of containers and often offer drop-off or curbside services.

There are countless options for purchasing a backyard composting container. You can also build your own.
