

1. Wrapping Paper – Alternatives and what’s recyclable

Wrapping paper with glitter, metallic accents, or that is shiny that is NOT recyclable due to their multi-material nature. Putting this wrapping paper will contaminate the recycling stream, please place this wrapping paper in the trash. The cardboard tube inside the wrapping paper is recyclable.

There are several options for wrapping paper that is recyclable. A good test for whether your wrapping paper is recyclable is the “scrunch test”. Scrunch up the wrapping paper into a ball, if it keeps its shape, the paper is recyclable, if it doesn’t, it belongs in the waste bin. Another way to tell is if it tears like printer paper, it is recyclable. If it doesn’t rip easily, it is not. Look for true “paper” wrapping paper when purchasing this year.

Additionally, if you are going to purchase non-recyclable wrapping paper, look at purchasing paper that is made from recyclable materials. If the wrapping paper is made from recycled material, it will be noted on the label.

- **Alternative ideas for gift wrapping**

- **Reusable gift bags**

Reusable tote bags can double as part of the gift as well as the gift bag. This is reusable and handy for the gift recipient. Saving and reusing holiday gift bags every year helps cut down on packaging waste.

- **Newspaper**

While newspaper is dwindling in households, a lot of homes still have old newspapers lying around. Consider wrapping your gifts in newspaper as a sustainable (and chic!) alternative to wrapping paper.

- **Furoshiki – Using fabric as wrapping paper**

Furoshiki is the Japanese tradition of wrapping gifts with fabric. This option is great as it can be reused every year.

3. Sustainable gift ideas
